

## Pastoral Letter

---



Dear Zion,

As we speak of outreach in this season of Epiphany, it's good to remember one simple thing:

The only outreach the Church really knows is the outstretched arms of Jesus on the cross.

People sometimes say that those nail-pierced arms were reaching out to embrace the whole world, but the truth is just the opposite. The pierced arms of Christ were letting go of the world. He let go of His creation and everything else: His rights, His people, His honor, and His life. On His cross, Jesus got stripped of everything.

Yet by letting go of all those things, Jesus made room in Himself for something else: our sin. In exchange for all that He gave up, Jesus took our sin into His own flesh, through the wounds and the rejection that His world laid on Him. He absorbed it like a sponge, and He carried it into the grave.

He therefore rose from the dead with the absolute authority to deal with sin and with sinners. How does He use that authority? He uses it to send forth His Church with a happy message: "Repent, and believe the good news!" The good news is that Jesus has forgiven your sin. He took it all, and where did He put it? No one knows. It's like something that you lost and never found—Jesus doesn't even go looking for it.

So there's the outreach of the Church: Jesus, stretching out His arms to let go of everything and take our sin in return. The Church lives to hear, speak, breathe, and eat and drink this forgiveness, even as we let go of our own lives. It's how we reach out.

You're forgiven. The weary fight is won. You're children of God. Go, tell someone.

### ***What and Why?***

*~ a Q & A column on the liturgy ~*

**Why do we stand at the end of certain hymns?** This question comes up from time to time. The final stanzas of some hymns specifically refer to the Holy Trinity, Father, Son, and Holy Spirit, and give Him glory. When a hymn has one of these stanzas, we stand for it, and if you wish, you may bow slightly in reverence to the holy, triune Name, and thanksgiving for its bestowal upon us in Holy Baptism.

**Why do we use “chant” in worship?** By setting portions of the liturgy to chant, we do several things: 1) we confess that this liturgy is *holy*, that is, it is a conversation unlike any other on earth, because it is God conversing with His Church; 2) we set God’s word to rhythms and melodies that help make it more memorable and plant it in the heart; and 3) we worship as Christians have worshiped for 2000 years, thus confessing our unity with believers in every time and place.

### **The Liturgy This Season**

In the month of February, we continue in the season of Epiphany. Epiphany means “show forth”—it is the season in which we give thanks for God “showing forth” His glory in the preaching, teaching, and miraculous healings of His Son.

The length of Epiphany depends on the placement of Easter. Epiphany after the twelve days of Christmas. But when Easter is late, then Lent (40 days before Easter, plus Sundays) begins later, thus making Epiphany longer.

Zion’s “Epiphany star” continues to shine by the altar, directing worshipers to where they will still find Jesus today: in the Holy Supper that He gave His Church to do in His remembrance until the end of time.

## From the Associate Pastor

---

*Acts 17:2-3 – “Paul went in, as was his custom, and on three Sabbath days he reasoned with them from the Scriptures, explaining and proving that it was necessary for the Christ to suffer and to rise from the dead...”*

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ of Zion,

Like last month, I shared a bit about how to engage in outreach on the home front, to those we know and are closest to. This group is the easiest to reach out to because they're always around and lots of opportunities can present themselves. This group, however, is also the hardest group to reach out to because they are so close, close enough we fear hurting our relationships by the very act of reaching out to them. A key motivation for outreach to those closest to us is this: The most loving thing we can do is let others know about the joy we have in Jesus Christ.

Some of us may be the talkative type and those in our direct circle of influence may be talkers too. If that is the case, a simple, unassuming kind of a conversation can be had. You have no ulterior motives other than simply talking. Talking about what struck you in the weekend's sermon might be the order of the day. Talking about a sight, sound, or smell that triggered a wonderful memory you had while in worship (with them or with your parents, for example) might be an opening to begin talking about the things of God. Talking about a powerful insight in your morning devotions might be a lead into a faith-filled conversation. The main point here is to let things be natural.

If you aren't the talkative type, know there are ways you can reach out to those closest to you too. For example, sharing a Facebook post from Zion could be a safe way for others to see what God is doing here. Forwarding on our weekly e-devotion can be a safe, simple way of sharing the Good News. Sending an encouraging text message that says something like, “At church now and we're singing your favorite hymn today!” Or if you're not into that kind of digital outreach, gifting a book is a safe and simple way to reach out. You could share copies of the Portals of Prayer devotionals we have here at Zion, or you could purchase a book from the local book store to give away. If you need ideas for books to give to skeptics, doubters, and the confused let us know!

Finally, and perhaps I should have mentioned this first, pray. Pray the Lord would do something powerful through your words and actions. Pray the Lord would give you the courage to talk about the Lord and His Church. Pray the Lord would soften hearts, open minds, and reorder priorities. Pray for the people you love knowing Jesus' love is always there for them. Remember also, it is God's eternal purpose that Jesus and His unsearchable riches would be found, given, shared, and cherished (Ephesians 3:7-12) and we get to be a part of that!

## From the Vicar

---

*“I have made you a light for the Gentiles, that you may bring salvation to the ends of the earth”* (Acts 13:47).

A few days ago I was talking to one of my friends who has recently found his home in the South. This friend has just gotten married and was brought back into the church by his wife. So, I asked him how he was enjoying life below the Mason-Dixon. Thoroughly pleased with all of the good things that have come, not only in marriage but in living a life faith in community, he was all too happy to let me know. So, he began to lay out for me, some of the things that he particularly appreciated about the South.

As he went through the list of what any Northern convert might say about weather and culture, he paused at the end. He said, “You know the real surprising and encouraging thing for me down here is how open people are in sharing their faith.” When I asked him to tell me a bit more about what he meant by that, he said; “Well you know, down here I am hard pressed to go a day without hearing the name of Jesus. And that’s any day. Whether it’s in church on Sunday, or at a gas station Thursday night, you are bound to run into Him.”

My friend wasn’t talking about the frequency at which he encountered what some might call traditional methods of evangelism. He wasn’t relaying an experience of being saved. He was simply commenting on how he was encouraged by what he heard. For a guy who had just gotten back on the path, for someone who was reveling in the enjoyment he found while on that way, he was simply talking about a name. For him this name was all the evangelism he needed to be kept in the light and life of God.

For many of us too, it can be as simple as that. Just as we all have names unto ourselves, as Christians we all have that common name to share: the one that says, “God saves.” This name that God so highly exalted brings the very thing it promises: namely, God’s own salvation (Phil 2:9-11; Rom 13:10). The mere sound of this name sends the demons running for cover (Lk 10:17). It heals and performs miracles (Acts 4:30). It even has the power to bring life amidst what is dead (Rom 6:3).

What an incredible impact this name can have. Just hearing it spoken around you can confirm his abiding presence in and amongst you. It not only reminds you of who you are — one who is saved in Him, but it confirms whose you are — a child of the heavenly Father and heir to the kingdom.

It’s good to see my friend receiving the gifts God gives for what they are: as good things to give thanks for (1 Tim 4:4). Every time he hears the name of Jesus, what is given is confirmed: a new creation that is indeed very good! Sometimes it’s just as simple as that. Thanks be to God!

Hope also has an SRA (Sexual Risk Avoidance) Instructor that visits young people at local schools, church groups and organizations with a presentation about sexually integrity.

Nearly 70 churches in Wausau, Antigo and the surrounding areas, partner with Hope as they affirm life and share the love and forgiveness found only in Jesus Christ.
